Welcoming new apprentices at Langmatz

All apprenticeships at the region's largest industrial employer are once again filled

Garmisch-Partenkirchen, 07 September 2020 - The new vocational training 2020/2021 also started at Langmatz GmbH on 01 September. Six trainees started their apprenticeships in different professional fields at the company, which specialises in plastics and metal processing. This year they include two industrial clerks, a specialist in warehouse logistics, a process mechanic for plastics and rubber technology, an industrial mechanic and an IT specialist for system integration. At the same time, a student on an integrated degree course in plastics engineering started his vocational training at Langmatz. "Fortunately, we had a large number of promising applicants once again this year, so that we were once again able to fill all vacant positions with committed young people," emphasises Training Coordinator Angelika Schubert.

Induction days for apprentices

At Langmatz, apprentices traditionally are in for an extensive programme during their induction days. As was again the case this year, it is customary at the largest employer and industrial training company in the region that the young apprentices are personally welcomed by Stephan Wulf, the Chairman of the Executive Board, with a welcoming speech. On the first day, the Management presents the company and the Head of the Commercial department, the Head of Human Resources and the Works Council and Youth Council introduce themselves in person. At lunchtime, everyone meets up for a traditional lunch of sausage. Over the following days, the young people get to know the most important products and receive detailed occupational safety and data protection instructions. There are also training courses on the materials used and sustainability at Langmatz, as well as visits to the plants in Garmisch-Partenkirchen and Oberau.

Attractive Training Facility

Langmatz is known for the high quality of its vocational training concept in the region and has received several awards from the Chamber of Industry and Commerce (IHK) for its - most recently in 2019 as "IHK Top Training Partner," together with the Bürgermeister-Schütte primary and secondary school. In the steadily growing industrial company, much is done to support the apprentices, and the success of the concept speaks for itself: Langmatz apprentices do exceptionally well in their final exams and generally continue working at the company. The company also goes above and beyond to ensure that the young people perceive Langmatz as an attractive training facility. Langmatz regularly gives talks in schools on career choice, offers internships, taster apprenticeships and attends vocational training fairs.

Supporting our young talent

For more than 50 years, Langmatz has been training young career-starters, currently offering ten different recognised technical and commercial apprenticeship careers, and five integrated degree courses. The company is highly committed to promoting and training its own young talent. The company's 440 employees currently include 35 apprentices and four integrated degree students on a Bachelor's course and three on a Master's course. Renowned for its innovation, the company develops, produces and markets technical system solutions for the power engineering, telecommunication and traffic engineering sectors.
